Naming

The naming of blooms before judging in classes 1 & 2 is compulsory and is desirable in other classes. Under the standards, exhibits can be penalized for unnamed blooms. If the name is not known, label “unknown” or “name wanted”.

Staging Requirements

- With the exception of class 2, Exhibition blooms must be staged one to a container without added foliage (i.e. no loose or extra foliage is allowed), and blooms must be at least 150mm above the top of the container.
- The wiring of roses is not permitted.
- Full bloom roses must show stamens or centre and be staged in one container.
- A single rose must not have more than eight petals.
- Bunch and decorative roses are to be staged in one container.
- A standard unit is a vase of one cultivar- e.g. 1 exhibition rose; a container of cluster roses; four stages – bud to full bloom; 3 cuts of miniature; 3 or 5 stems of bunch; 3 cuts of decorative; etc.

Note: Entries in classes 1 & 2 are restricted to one per exhibitor..
For classes 1 & 2 staging time is 9.00am.

1. **ACT Rose Championship** (to be point judged)

Pialligo Nurseries & Landscaping Centres Perpetual Trophy

Three exhibition roses, distinct; plus any two of the following units:-

- Container of cluster roses, one cultivar
- Roses, one cultivar, four stages- bud to full bloom
- Bunch roses, three cuts, one cultivar
- Container of miniature roses, three cuts, one cultivar

1st: \$30 plus Ribbon and will hold the trophy until the next Autumn Flower Show.

2nd: \$20, 3rd: \$10, 4th: \$5.

Exhibition Roses

2. **J. A. Carrodus Memorial Perpetual Trophy**

Nine exhibition roses, at least four cultivars, staged in a society green vase.

1st: \$15 and will hold the trophy until the next Autumn Flower Show

2nd: \$10, 3rd: \$5, 4th: \$2

Note: Champion Exhibition Rose may be selected from this class.

3. One.
4. Three, distinct.
5. Three, nnd.
6. Four stages- bud to full bloom (four stems), one cultivar.

Full Bloom Roses

7. One.
8. Three distinct, in one container.
9. Three, nnd, in one container.

Cluster Roses

- a. A container of cluster roses must have at least 10 fully opened florets, with any number of cuts unless otherwise stated.
 - b. In classes other than 11 only one cultivar to a container.
 - c. Cluster roses should be fresh, of full size for the cultivar and of a form typical of that cultivar.
 - d. A container consisting of unopened or partly opened buds would not allow an assessment of size and form to be made.
10. One container, one cultivar.
 11. One container, mixed cultivars.
 12. Three containers, three cultivars.
 13. Three containers, nnd.

Miniature Roses

- a. Exhibits in these classes should not exceed 250mm from the top of the container to the top of the exhibit.
 - b. With the exception of classes 17 and 18, miniature roses must be staged three cuts to a container.
14. Three cuts, one cultivar.
 15. Three cuts, distinct.
 16. Three cuts, nnd.
 17. One cultivar, four stages- bud to full bloom, in one container(four stems).
 18. Container of miniature roses, at least three cultivars.

Old fashioned type & Heritage Roses (including David Austin roses)

Judged on flower shape classifications of the H.S.O.C, Inc.

Float bowls may be used.

19. One cut of single (five petals) or semi-single (two rows of petals) bloom/s.
20. One cut flat quartered bloom/s.
21. One cut any other type bloom/s.
22. Three cuts, nnd, in one container.
23. Flat bowl, max. nine blooms, nnd.

Garden Roses

24. One cut, single rose (5 to 8 petals).
25. Bunch roses, three cuts, any cultivar/s, in one container.
26. Bunch roses, three cuts, one cultivar, in one container.
27. Bunch roses, five cuts, nnd, in one container.

Note: Bunch classes- shown on single stem without side buds. Stems should be of good length and blooms at an even stage of development. They should not have reached exhibition stage of development.

Note: Decorative roses- a cut of decorative roses can have flowers ranging from the bud stage to the full bloom stage, side buds and/or multiple blooms allowed; exhibition forms not required. Examples:- Alexander, Queen Elizabeth, Granada, Pink Panther, Just Joey, Double Delight.

CUT FLOWER COLLECTIONS

- Note:** a) Exhibitors may use their own containers in all classes.
b) In classes 96 & 97 exhibitors should take care to ensure that flowers, spikes or cuts are distinct kinds. Similarly, in Class 95, each container of flowers must be distinct. For example, azaleas and rhododendrons are not distinct kinds; similarly, different types of roses are not distinct kinds. A daffodil and a ranunculus are distinct kinds.

95. The Steward Cup

Collection of cut flowers(may include flowering shrub/s), three kinds, each in a separate container.

1st: \$10 and will hold the trophy until the next Autumn Flower Show.
2nd: \$5, 3rd: \$2.

96. The Dalgarno Trophy

One flower, spike or cut of five distinct kinds(may include flowering shrub/s),
in one container.

1st: \$6 and will hold the trophy until the next Autumn Flower Show.
2nd: \$4, 3rd: \$2.

97. The Peterson Bowl

One flower, spike or cut of five distinct kinds (may include flowering shrub/s), in one container, height not to exceed 250mm above the table, including container. Flowers in this class should, where possible, be in proportion with the height of the exhibit.

1st: \$6 and will hold the trophy until the next Autumn Flower Show.
2nd: \$4, 3rd: \$2.

GERANIUMS/PELARGONIUMS

One plant per pot or container. Naming of plants is desirable.

- 145. One pot dwarf in bloom. Plants must not exceed 200mm in height from the top of soil to top of the foliage.
- 146. One pot Zonal in bloom.
- 147. One pot fancy leaf (with or without flowers).
- 148. One pot scented-leafed (with or without flowers).
- 149. One pot Regal pelargonium, in bloom
- 150. One pot Mini -Regal or Angel pelargonium, in bloom
- 151. One pot Ivy or hybrid Ivy, in any type or size of container.

Cut flowers

TRUSS: A cluster of florets growing from one stem. Stems should be full length and not cut off. No foliage permitted.

CUT: A cut is a portion of the plant with or without its laterals.
