Staging Requirements

- Exhibitors are requested to name exhibits, if possible.
- Spikes and individual blooms to be staged one per container unless otherwise stated.
- Individual blooms of Bearded Iris are to sit neatly on the rim of the container.

Definition of terms used in the schedule:

STANDARDS	The three upper petals of the flower.
FALLS	The three lower petals of the flower.
AMOENA	White or near white standards, coloured falls.
BLEND	A mixture of two or more colours.
BRED	Plants raised by the exhibitor from seed produced by the exhibitor.
NEGLECTA	Light blue standards, darker blue falls.
PLICATA	Petals light coloured, falls and/or standards edged or stippled with darker colour.
SELF	All petals one solid colour, not necessarily including the beard.
VARIEGATA	Yellow standards, brown, purple or violet falls.

b. In Classes 86–87, exhibitors should take care to ensure that flowers, spikes or cuts are distinct kinds. Similarly, in Class 85, each container of flowers must be distinct. For example, azaleas and rhododendrons are not distinct kinds; similarly, different types of roses are not distinct kinds. A daffodil and a ranunculus are distinct kinds.
