### Naming

The naming of blooms before judging in Classes 1 and 2 is compulsory and is desirable in other Classes.

### Staging Requirements

- The wiring of roses is not permitted.
- Full bloom roses must show stamens or centre and be staged in one container.
- With the exception of Class 2, Exhibition blooms must be staged one to a container without added foliage (i.e., no loose or extra foliage is allowed), and blooms must be at least 150mm above the top of the container.
- A single rose must have not more than eight petals.
- Bunch and decorative roses are to be staged in one container.
- A standard unit is a vase of one cultivar- e.g. 1 exhibition rose, a container of cluster roses, four stages- bud to full bloom, 3 cuts miniature, 3 or 5 stems of bunch, 3 cuts of decorative, etc.

### Exhibitors Please Note:

- For Classes 1 & 2 - staging time is by 9.00 am.
- Classes 1 and 2 are restricted to one per exhibitor.

Three exhibition roses, distinct, plus any two of the following units:

- Container of cluster roses, one cultivar;

- Container, three cuts of miniature roses, one cultivar.

1<sup>st</sup>: \$30 plus ribbon and will hold the Trophy until the following Autumn Flower Show.

2<sup>nd</sup>: \$20. 3<sup>rd</sup>: \$10. 4<sup>th</sup>: \$5.

- d) A container consisting of unopened or partly opened buds would not allow an assessment of size and form to be made.

## CUT FLOWER COLLECTIONS

### Note:

- a) Exhibitors may use their own container in all classes.
- b) In Classes 96 & 97, exhibitors should take care to ensure that flowers, spikes or cuts are distinct kinds. Similarly, in Class 95, each container of flowers must be distinct. For example, azaleas and rhododendrons are not distinct kinds; similarly, different types of roses are not distinct kinds. A daffodil and a ranunculus are distinct kinds.

### 90. The Steward Cup

Collection of cut flowers (may include flowering shrub/s), three kinds, each in separate container.

1st: \$10 and winner will hold the Cup until next year's Autumn Flower Show.

### 91. The Dalgarno Trophy

One flower, spike or cut, of five distinct kinds (may include flowering shrub/s) in one container, height not to exceed 250mm above the table, including container. Flowers in this class should, where possible, be in proportion with the height of the exhibit.
